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# Upcoming ANHIX Events

The next event will be the Winter Conference jointly presented by ANHIX and Digital Health Canada. The Conference which will be in-person, will be held on Tuesday, February 6, 2024, in Calgary at the Hotel Arts. Program details will be available soon.

The ANHIX Spring Symposium/AGM will take place in **April/May 2024**, in Edmonton. Details will be available early in the new year.

### Summer Symposium 2023

The Summer Symposium was held at The Ranch Golf and Country Club on Wednesday, Sep 14. 64 people registered for the event.

The speaker session opened with Quinn Mah, Act. Assistant Deputy Minister for Alberta Health (AH) – Health Information Systems Division presenting "Sharpening our Focus", a presentation discussing Alberta Health's key concerns and mandate. Key concerns include Health Workforce Planning, Emergency Department/Surgery Wait Times, Emergency Medical Services, Primary, Continuing, Rural and Indigenous Health Care, and Responding to the Mental Health/Addiction Crisis.

AH is responsible for delivering on the Minister's 19 individual mandate items. System transformation will impact the entire health system so will be completed first to ground all other actions. Initiatives will drive local decision-making centered around patients and their families, including a focus on rural needs.

Next up was a panel discussion "Collaborating for success: Creating the future of health care in Alberta", moderated by Nancy Walter, Alberta Innovates. The discussion explored key barriers, enablers and lessons learned regarding collaboration to create winning conditions for the technology advancement in Alberta's health system. Panelists included Alex Alexander, Exec. Director, Alberta Health; Dr Jeremy Theal, Chief Medical Information Officer, AHS; Mark Scheffer, IT Executive Director, Health Information Exchange; and Tim Murphy, Vice President, Health, Alberta Innovates.

From the discussion, key enablers for collaboration emerged and included:

- having the right mindset;
- creating good governance models;
- creating aligned incentives;
   and
- supporting legislation that is in keeping with the digital age.

Further, collaboration was identified as a key driver for solution design that keeps the need of the end user in the forefront in turn promoting the efficient use of health information technology. The panel concluded by encouraging the audience to lean on our ecosystem friends when trying to solve complex real-world problems.

The session concluded with a second panel discussion — "Engaging patients and providers to execute the province's health sector mandates". Moderated by Zac Rodrigo, Telus Health it included perspectives from Ewan Affleck (College of Physicians and Surgeons), Judy Birdsell (Imagine Citizens Network), Fesial Keshavjee (CBI Health) and Damon Mayes (Alberta College of Registered Nurses).

Discussion touched on the history of health service coordination and delivery in Alberta, the challenges and opportunities experienced by health sectors resulting from the legislative fragmentation of health services, and the strategic imperatives that must be considered in the coming Alberta health sector transformation.

The audience were treated to a discussion that included the passionate recounting of the panelists' experiences as provincial and federal leaders of the Canadian health sector, and included many moments of contemplation. Through deep expertise, insightful action-biased takeaways, and good humour, our panelists delivered an insightful conversation.

# How Learnings from a Global Digital Health Assessment can be leveraged to Improve Health Outcomes

As the Canadian healthcare system continues to recover from the effects of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the adoption of patient and citizen engagement solutions has slowed. Solutions such as Remote Patient Monitoring tools, Personal Health Records and enhanced Electronic Medical Record Patient Portals have proven to be effective mechanisms through which citizens can gain access to their health information.

These solutions also equip the citizen and patient with enhanced self-serve capabilities, to better educate themselves on their own health and strengthen self-management, resulting in improved health outcomes.

Whilst adoption of these type of solutions saw a significant increase during COVID-19, primarily out of necessity and limited access to inperson resources, these adoption levels have not been sustained. In an effort to explore how other countries have leveraged digital technologies at scale and identify lessons learned for the Canadian context, TELUS Health commissioned a PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC) Global Digital Health Assessment with a focus on five countries:

Australia, Denmark, the Netherlands, Sweden and the United Kingdom. The primary objective of the assessment was to identify best practices and key learnings from elsewhere, which may be used to inform solutions that could be implemented within Canada. The following summarizes some of the findings of the PwC study:

Digital Health as a Public Policy
Priority - A common theme across all
countries assessed was a focus on
public policy as a driver of digital
health technological adoption.
Prioritizing digital health is a catalyst
for success, whilst also making it a
key component of a broader approach
to digital technology within public
policy and society as a whole.
Jurisdictions that have successfully
scaled these technologies have done
so by linking digital health tools to
public health goals such as wellbeing
and prosperity.

#### The Crisis was a Good Eye Opener

- Countries assessed were able to leverage the COVID-19 period to accelerate the implementation and adoption of digital health echnologies, however with sustained growth post-Pandemic. Several countries took bold actions during the Pandemic and fostered buy-in from key stakeholder groups (providers, patients and insurers).

#### **Country Context and Culture -**

The assessment found that country context and culture can play a role in digital health success. In jurisdictions where digital technologies are leveraged to access public services at scale, adoption within the healthcare sector is high and often accepted as the norm. The shift towards digital health was accelerated through involvement from all stakeholders, whilst also creating shared goals.

Strong Governance and National Leadership - Strong, coordinated leadership and governance that prioritized digital health, was shown to be critical to ensuring continued adoption of technology within the healthcare sector in the reviewed jurisdictions. This governance played a significant role in advancing interoperability between systems, coordination across regions, and establishing standards to ensure consistency, quality and security.

TELUS Health believes that this assessment should be a starting point for discussion, to inform how Canadian jurisdictions can leverage learnings from other countries to enhance and amplify the impact digital technologies can have on outcomes.
